

Democracy Commission – Kirklees Council staff survey

441 employees took part in this short online survey about local democracy. The survey ran during September 2016.

Results for this set of questions closely mirror the feelings of our residents' e-panel – many of our staff live in Kirklees, with their perceptions as residents influencing their views. There are mixed perceptions on how decisions are made, and limited understanding of the process. A high proportion believe they have never influenced a council decision, despite the majority being interested in how decisions are made.

It would save money for us to elect Kirklees councillors only once every four years, but this would mean you would get to exercise your right to vote less often (at the moment we elect councillors three years out of every four). How would you feel about changing to one local election every four years?

There is strong feeling from those employees that took part that we should move to four yearly voting. For comparison 61% of our residents' e-panel felt the same way.

While there is clearly some uncertainty around making changes to the way we vote, the majority were in agreement about electronic voting being a positive step. Almost half of respondents thought that 16 year olds should be able to vote. Only 1 in 10 respondents to this staff survey disagreed that the local community should have more control, showing an appetite for more devolved decision making in the local area.
